Cultural Aide Program 2009-2010

This past fall semester, the *Cultural Aide Program* kicked off its 41st year. This year we have 67 Aides who serve as undergraduate student staff members and reside in residence halls across campus. By providing individualized student contact, informing students about the numerous resources on campus, and providing opportunities for students to meet and interact with students of different cultural backgrounds and experiences, Cultural Aides help students make successful social, cultural and academic transitions at *Michigan State University*. As student leaders, Cultural Aides serve as role models, peer educators and a resource for students within the halls aiming to help create an inclusive environment. In addition to their task of assisting students, the *Cultural Aide Program* prides itself on the professional and personal development of these outstanding Aides. The program promotes the importance of cross-cultural communication and interaction along with Academic excellence. *Over half of all our Aides (61%) earned a GPA of 3.0 or higher during Fall 2009*

semester. Almost 1/3 of all our Aides (30%) earned a GPA of 3.5 or higher during Fall 2009 semester while four of our Aides received a 4.0.

In addition to the leadership this program provides students in becoming Cultural Aides, it also provides further leadership advancement as Cultural Aides have the opportunity to move on to become Team Coordinators (pictured above). This year we have nine Team Coordinators who lead a group of Cultural Aides within teams ranging from 4—10 Aides.

OCAT Multicultural Center

In January 1999, the Multicultural Center of Michigan State University opened its doors after many years of collective advocacy by the *Council of Racial Ethnic Students (CORES)*. CORES successfully convinced the MSU administration that a Multicultural Center was necessary and critical to the implementation of one of MSU's guiding principles: "Advance Diversity Within Community." *Currently, the Center has:*

- SPACE available for student group meetings and programs.
- Four COMPUTERS for general student use, where students can do their homework, write papers, check their e-mail, and surf the web.
- Small collection of RESOURCE MATERIALS such as videos of racially / ethnically-themed films, books, and publications (magazines, journals).

The Center hosts a variety of different programs throughout the school year, from academically-oriented presentations to student group meetings to informal social receptions to which everyone is welcome to attend.

The CORES offices (Asian Pacific American Student Organization; Black Student Alliance; Culturas de la Razas Unidas; and North American Indigenous Student Organization) are also located within the center.

Use of the Center's space can be requested by completing a "Booking Request Form" which is available at the Center or at <u>http://mcc.msu.edu/</u>. Forms must be submitted at least two weeks prior to the requested date.

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
