OPENING REMARKS



Dr. Jabbar R. Bennett

Jabbar R. Bennett is MSU's vice president and chief diversity officer. Bennett works to advance MSU's diversity, equity, and inclusion strategic priorities along with staff in the Office for Inclusion and Intercultural Initiatives, and partnership among senior executives, deans, faculty, staff, students, and alumni. Bennett is also a professor of medicine in the College of Human Medicine.

Prior to joining MSU in December 2020, Bennett served as the inaugural associate provost for diversity and inclusion, and chief diversity officer at Northwestern University. Previously, he worked as associate dean of the Graduate School, and associate dean for diversity in the Division of Biology and Medicine at Brown University. Bennett has held administrative appointments at Brigham and Women's Hospital, Harvard Medical School, and United Way of Massachusetts Bay and Merrimack Valley. He has served on the faculty at Harvard, Brown, and Northwestern.

Bennett received a BS in biology and minor in Spanish from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University and earned a PhD in biomedical sciences from Meharry Medical College. Bennett completed postdoctoral research training at Harvard Medical School and is an alumnus of the Harvard University Administrative Fellows Program, and Massachusetts Education Policy Fellowship Program.

Dr. Chezare A. Warren

Dr. Chezare A. Warren is an Associate Professor of Urban Education and Teacher Education at Michigan State University. His scholarship broadly examines issues of race and justice with particular interest in Black students' education outcomes. Dr. Warren is recipient of numerous national recognitions for his scholarship including a 2019-2020 National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine/Ford Foundation postdoctoral fellowship, and the American Educational Research Association "Teaching and Teacher Education" 2018 Early Career Award. Dr. Warren has held visiting faculty appointments at Stanford University, New York University, and the University of Pennsylvania. His scholarly publications appear in several top-ranked peer-reviewed journals including *Journal of Teacher Education*, *Teachers College Record*, and *Educational Researcher*. His latest book, *Centering Possibility in Black Education* (Teachers College Press, Columbia University, 2021) is set for publication this spring. KENNETH FRANKLIN



Dr. Lee N. June

Lee N. June, a native of Manning, South Carolina earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Tuskegee Institute/now Tuskegee University (biology); Master of Education (rehabilitation counseling), Master of Arts (clinical psychology), and the Doctor of Philosophy in clinical psychology all from the University of Illinois-Champaign- Urbana. He also earned a Master of Ministry Leadership degree from Grand Rapids Theological Seminary (Cornerstone University); a Certificate in Theological Studies from the Interdenominational Theological Seminary (Atlanta, Georgia); and did sabbatical study as a special student at the Duke University Divinity School. He is a licensed clinical psychologist in the state of Michigan.

Lee is the author, co-author, editor, or co-editor of numerous journal articles/book chapters and six books- *The Black family: Past Present, and Future* (1991), *Men to Men* (with Matthew Parker (1996), *Evangelism and Discipleship in African American Churches* (with Matthew Parker- 1999), *Counseling for Seemingly Impossible Problems* (with Sabrina Black and Willie Richardson- 2002), and Yet With a Steady *Beat: The Black Church Through a Psychological and Biblical Lens* (2008), and *African American Church Leadership: Principles of Effective Ministry and Community Leadership* (with Christopher Mathis (2013). Lee is currently a professor in the Honors College and Department of Psychology at Michigan State University. He previously served as the director of the counseling center, as senior advisor to the provost for racial, ethnic and multicultural issues, assistant/associate provost for academic student services and multicultural issues, and vice president for student affairs and services- all at Michigan State University. His current interests and research are in the areas of the art and science of effective support services delivery to college students, factors affecting graduation and retention rates, multicultural psychology, and the psychology of religion and spirituality. He currently teaches a course entitled "The Psychology of Religion and Spirituality" and co-teaches a freshman Honors seminar focusing on inequities.

Among his many recognitions, Lee has received the Michigan State University Black Student Alliance Outstanding Administrator Award (2005); the Michigan State University Distinguished Black Alumni Award (2006); the Michigan State University All University Diversity Life Time Achievement Award (2006); the Michigan State University Muslim Students Association Recognition Award (2006); and the Greater Lansing Area Club of the National Business Professional Women's Club Frederick Douglas Award (2016).

He is active in his local church (New Mount Calvary Baptist Church) where he serves on the ministerial staff and teaches Sunday school. He also serves as the Dean of the Lansing Area Ministerial Alliance, a member of the Advisory Council for Our Daily Bread Ministries, member of the Board of Directors of Free International Missions, chair of the Board of Directors for the Institute for Black Family Development, member of the Board of Trustees for Cornerstone University, member of the Executive Board on the Lansing chapter of the NAACP, and as a Commissioner on the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Commission of Mid-Michigan.

Lee is married to Shirley Spencer June and they are the parents of two sons, Brian and Stephen.
